Student Teacher Stipend Provide \$9,000 stipends for OPS student teachers and \$1,500 stipends for their mentors	\$3.95m

\$2.35m

Provide funding for advanced academic tuition and exam fees (e.g., advanced placement, Cambridge, and International Baccalaureate exams) as well as OPS-approved dual enrollment courses

Next Level Learning – Extra Half Day (Session 1) Expand NLL to a full day for middle school students	\$2.55m
Next Level Learning – Additional Curriculum Enhancements to student engagement for elementary and middle school students; includes hands-on, exploratory experiences in a camp-like environment with more interactive classroom experiences	\$6.00m
