The Omaha Public Schools (OPS) implements Multi-Tiered Systems of Support for Behavior (MTSS-B) to promote student use of positive behavior. Through this framework, OPS has committed to providing staff with tools and resources to positively engage students and families through implementation of school-wide positive behavior interventions. These practices are designed to support safe and encouraging learning environments.


We believe that we cannot "make" students learn or behave. But we can create environments to increase the likelihood of positive behaviors occurring.

MTSS-B is a research-based, highly effective behavioral framework that is designed for teaching and reinforcing students' social, emotional, and academic learning skills in order to sustain academic achievement and support the social, emotional, and behavioral well-being of students. Consistent implementation of MTSS-B leads to:

- Improved school climate;
- Reductions in major disciplinary infractions;
- Improved academic achievement;
- Improved concentration, positive social behavior, and emotional regulation.

OPS is committed to supporting students through behavior interventions and alternatives to exclusionary practices that require removal from the educational setting where the safety of the student and/or others is not of immediate concern.

MTSS-B utilizes consistent practices that have tiers of increasingly intensive supports, and in our schools, this includes:



Social Emotional Learning (SEL)

In addition to MTSS-B, Omaha Public Schools continues to support Social Emotional Learning (SEL) development through curriculum, strategies, and resources. SEL is defined by the Collaborative of Academic Social Emotional Learning (CASEL) as the process through which all young people and adults acquire and apply the knowledge, skills, and attitudes to develop healthy identities, manage emotions and achieve personal and collective goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain supportive relationships, and make responsible and caring decisions.


Within the Omaha Public Schools, our goal is to focus on CASEL's five SEL competencies:

- Responsible Decision-Making


SEL promotes knowledge, skills, and attitudes that support lifelong success and advance educational equity and excellence.

Our continuing aim will foster respect for home and family, pride in one's cultural heritage, and personal independence. We ask children to accept responsibility for their actions and encourage them to use sound judgment in making decisions appropriate for their age levels. Truth and honesty will be priorities in character development.

School hours: 8:50 a.m. - 4:05 p.m.
Office hours: 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m.

Breakfast: Grab and Go breakfast from 8:25 a.m.

Students should NOT be dropped off before 8:25 a.m. Students in grades KG - 6th grade may proceed to their classrooms at 8:25 a.m. **Students may not go to their classrooms before that time as teachers are not on duty until 8:25 a.m.** Students are to line up in the breakfast line before that time, even if they do not wish to eat breakfast. Students may proceed to their classrooms from the line at 8:25 a.m.

Lunch: Available in the café 11:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (see grade level schedule).

Students may purchase a hot lunch or bring a cold lunch. Lunch boxes should be marked with the child's name and room number. Please do not include candy or pop in a lunch packed from home. Students may not bring chips, candy, gum or pop to school.

Foods in competition with the National School Breakfast and School Lunch Programs are prohibited by the United States Department of Agriculture. This applies to foods such as pizza, hamburgers, etc. that are brought in during the meal service times. Omaha Public Schools could lose reimbursement money if we are found in violation of this policy.

Field Trip Procedures

Field trips are pre-planned and are designed to provide an educational experience. Students must be courteous, be able to follow directions and be cooperative during the field trips.

Permission slips or written permission must be returned to the teachers by the deadline or the student will not be able to attend the field trip.

Transportation to and from the field trips is usually provided by commercial bus companies and occasionally by staff. Due to liability concerns, we ask that all parents drive themselves to and from the field trip.

Traffic Safety

Safety is our greatest concern. Be an example of courtesy and care to our children. Please drive slowly. Do not leave your car unattended unless in a proper parking space.

Drop off students in the *driveway only, NEVER* at the curb in traffic. The east side of the building is reserved for buses only. When traffic in the driveway comes to a stop, please have your student(s) get out of the vehicle on the school side of the driveway and walk directly to the sidewalk. Do not wait to drop your student(s) at the front door as this delays the flow of traffic.

School dismissal takes 10-15 minutes. Again, please use the driveway only. If you are walking, or choose to park at the Children's Museum, you must use the crosswalk at 20th and St. Mary's Ave. or at 22nd and St. Mary's Ave.

Student Planner

Planners are used by students in grades Early Childhood-6. The Planners are our best communication tool. Assignment Planners help families stay informed about daily work and school events. Please review and sign your child's Planner each day.

Homework

We encouraged students to read each evening at home. We also encourage parents to read to or with their children. When a student has work to do at home, it will be to practice or review skills learned at school.

Parent/Teacher Conferences

Conferences are held during the first and third quarters. Parents are invited to sign up for a conference time at Open House at the beginning of the year. We will reserve that same time for third-quarter conferences but can adjust as necessary as schedules do change. Communication is the key to a successful school. Open communication should be on-going throughout the school year.

Liberty Expectations

- 1. Follow all directions promptly
- 2. Speak and listen respectfully
- 3. Keep hands, feet and objects to yourself
- 4. Take responsibility for your actions
- 5. Treat your school and property with respect
- 6. Walk quietly, go directly to your destination and through the proper door
- 7. Use playground equipment properly
- 8. Play in designated areas
- 9. Rough play and throwing objects are not allowed
- 10. Use restrooms properly and leave them clean and litter free.

Liberty Elementary Schoolwide Plan

A vital part of education is learning positive social skills. We will spend time during the first few weeks of school and throughout the year discussing your child's responsibility for following routines and procedures established by the school. Appropriate behavior in our schools is a responsibility to be shared by students, parents, and school staff. We will encourage our students to be safe, be thoughtful and be determined in all that they do.

In addition to routines and procedures, reasonable guidelines for student behavior have been established by the Omaha Public Schools to help students develop an increasing amount of self-discipline. The guidelines apply in the classroom, in the school building, on the school grounds, at all school functions and on buses and vans.

All students have the right to pursue an education in an environment conducive to learning. Therefore, all students are expected to act in a way that does not distract from another student's right to learn. All students are expected to know and follow the school rules.

The staff at Liberty Elementary believes that learning positive social skills is an ongoing teaching process that fosters respect and dignity for all individuals. It is proactive, developmentally informed, culturally and gender sensitive. It stresses growth, individual responsibility and problem solving in a collaborative effort among students, parents, educators and the community.

Devices and Social Media

iPads and laptops are district property. We exspect students to use the devices appropriately and as tools for learning. They will lose the privilege of accessing a device if they cannot. Insurance is available for purchase as well.

If a family chooses to let their child have a personal device or social media, the family is responsible for the care and monitoring of the device and accounts. Personal devices will stay in backpack. Students cannot use personal devices during the school day. Please contact the principal or your child's teachers for any questions.

Snacks, Candy and Gum

There are no snacks, candy, or gum allowed at school unless there is a special event in which they have been approved. Students may choose to bring a complete lunch from home, but not just chips or a drink, If they are brought, they will be confiscated.

Toys, Games, Cell Phones and Dress

All school supplies are furnished to students. Toys, games, balls, pets, electronic equipment and other items should not be brought from home. Cell phones and other electronic devices distract students from learning. Emergency messages can be delivered to students through the office. With parental permission, cell phones may be brought to school but must immediately be given to the classroom teacher. The cell phone will be returned at dismissal each day. Students wearing hoodies must keep the hood off their head while inside the school for safety reasons. If the hood becomes an issue, students will be asked to store their hoodie in their locker. Heely shoes are only allowed if the wheels are removed.
