The Omaha Public Schools (OPS) implements Multi-Tiered Systems of Support for Behavior (MTSS-B) to promote student use of positive behavior. Through this framework, OPS has committed to providing staff with tools and resources to positively engage students and families through implementation of school-wide positive behavior interventions. These practices are designed to support safe and encouraging learning environments.


We believe that we cannot "make" students learn or behave. But we can create environments to increase the likelihood of positive behaviors occurring.

MTSS-B is a research-based, highly effective behavioral framework that is designed for teaching and reinforcing students' social, emotional, and academic learning skills in order to sustain academic achievement and support the social, emotional, and behavioral well-being of students. Consistent implementation of MTSS-B leads to:

- Improved school climate;
- Reductions in major disciplinary infractions;
- Improved academic achievement;
- Improved concentration, positive social behavior, and emotional regulation.

OPS is committed to supporting students through behavior interventions and alternatives to exclusionary practices that require removal from the educational setting where the safety of the student and/or others is not of immediate concern.

MTSS-B utilizes consistent practices that have tiers of increasingly intensive supports, and in our schools, this includes:



Social Emotional Learning (SEL)

In addition to MTSS-B, Omaha Public Schools continues to support Social Emotional Learning (SEL) development through curriculum, strategies, and resources. SEL is defined by the Collaborative of Academic Social Emotional Learning (CASEL) as the process through which all young people and adults acquire and apply the knowledge, skills, and attitudes to develop healthy identities, manage emotions and achieve personal and collective goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain supportive relationships, and make responsible and caring decisions.


Within the Omaha Public Schools, our goal is to focus on CASEL's five SEL competencies:

- Responsible Decision-Making


SEL promotes knowledge, skills, and attitudes that support lifelong success and advance educational equity and excellence.

The Saddlebrook Joint Facility

The Saddlebrook Joint Facility is a collaboration with the City of Omaha Recreation Department and the Omaha Public Library. It is unlike any school in the State of Nebraska and one of only a few in the United States. Its unique arrangement of elementary school, community center and public library under a single roof benefits all students, their families and our community members while incorporating life-long learning and wellness for life.

The facility features a commons area, the circulatory center of the building, which functions as a welcoming place for meetings, gatherings, and grade level assemblies. Saddlebrook students reap the benefits of two gyms, a mac and pc lab, an indoor running track, a "green" roof, and state of the art technology classrooms.

The building is a model of cooperation. Three groups with similar, yet supporting goals, come together to create an example for the rest of the United States.

There is no play period prior to school. Students wishing to eat breakfast may enter the cafeteria no earlier than 8:35 a.m. Students should not arrive to school earlier than 8:35 a.m. The school cannot assume responsibility for the supervision and safety of students arriving before those times. Parent(s)/guardian(s): Make sure your daycare or care provider knows the school arrival and dismissal time. Students may enter the building from either the school or library/community center side.

Dismissal

All Kindergarten students will dismiss through the Kindergarten doors at the South entry. Students wishing to go to the library or community center after school must exit the North doors and re-enter. 3rd - 5th grade students will dismiss through the North community center doors. 1st and 2nd Grade Students will dismiss through the North community center doors.

Homework and Late Assignments

Why Do Teachers Assign Homework?

Homework helps reinforce what has been learned in class, prepares the students for upcoming lessons, teaches responsibility, and helps students develop positive study habits. Teachers do not send homework home simply to have "homework". Homework will be sent home if the student is not completing the work at school, or if there is extra practice or review needed on a particular content area.

Late Assignments

Assignments are expected to be submitted on the day they are due. Late assignments are handled individually by classroom teachers. If late work becomes a continuous habit then the teacher will notify the parents to work out a solution that will help the student. When homework is requested for an absent child, please do so before 9:30 a.m. It will be in the office at 4:05 p.m.

Traffic Safety

Parents are urged to drive with extreme caution in the school neighborhood. **Parents must not park in the bus area or in the driveway of the school parking lot.** Please use extreme caution and courtesy when dropping your child off in front of school. Be aware of crosswalks. **Parents are to remain in their cars when parked in the parking lot.**

School Breakfast and Lunch

Breakfast is free to all students. Doors open at 8:35 a.m. **Please do not send your child before this time.** Breakfast will be eaten in your child's classroom in the morning.

Student's lunch time will vary depending on the lunch schedule. All lunch for the 2023-24 school year will be free to all students.

If your child is allergic to any particilar food, please contact your doctor and have them put it in writing and send the note to the school. This is required by Federal guidelines. White/Chocolate milk accompanies the school lunch. If your child is choosing a school lunch they will not be allowed to bring additional food to supplement the school lunch. Students cannot bring just chips or snacks to supplement for the lunch. **Children my not bring pop in their lunch.**

Special Occasions, Parties, Treats

There are two parties during the school year: Fall Festival and Valentine's Day. The PTA will be hosting these parties in the gym. Special notices from the PTA will be sent home with specific information/cost regarding these parties. At the end of the day for on Fall Festival Day we will be doing a costume parade. Costumes must be school appropriate, and must not contain any weapons.

If a student wants to celebrate a birthday, we try not to disrupt the instructional day as much as possible. All birthday recognitions will be at the end of the day. If you are planning to provide a treat for the class, Saddlebrook is a healthy food site, and we would prefer that all treats be healthy. **No homemade or home baked treats are permitted to be brought from home by the students to share. Non editable items are preferred.**

Safety To and From School

The school's Crossing Guard Program has been established for one reason ... **The Safety of Our Children.** Please help our Crossing Guards by insisting on respect and obedience of the rules and regulations of our school. Remember, **the Crossing Guard is providing a service** for our school and must be on duty in rain, sleet, snow, and in frigid weather. The Crossing Guards ask students to follow a few common sense rules:

- 1. Wait until the Crossing Guard has reached the middle of the street and all cars have stopped.
- 2. Listen to the Crossing Guard for directions.
- 3. Don't push, shove, or run.
- 4. Walk while crossing the street.
- 5. Stand behind the Crossing Guard while waiting to cross.

6. Parents, please remember to use the crosswalk and obey the Crossing Guard while crossing your child.

Bicycles/Skateboards/Rollerstakes

Riding bicycles to and from Saddlebrook is encouraged. Bike racks are located on both the school and library side of the facility. For safety reasons, skateboards and any form of roller skates/blades are not permitted to and from school.

Questions/Concerns

If parents have a question or concern regarding a situation with their child in school, they are encouraged to follow these steps:

- 1. Contact the child's teacher to discuss the concerns and possible solutions.
- 2. If the concern cannot be resolved with the teacher, the parent should then schedule a conference with the principal.
- 3. If the parent still feels the problem has not been resolved, further recourse is available through the Student Community Services.

Saddlebrook School Colors and Mascot

We at Saddlebrook Elementary are proud of our school! We believe it is important for all children to feel and experience a sense of pride in themselves and in their school. Pride in one's school helps to establish a feeling of belonging, loyalty, and security for each student. Our school colors are forest green and silver. Our school mascot is the "Green Wave". Every Friday we will celebrate our spirit and pride by wearing our school colors. This is a visible way of feeling a true belonging to our school/community family.

Behavior Outline

Behavior expectations appropriate in the school building, and on the playground and bus:

Restroom Expectations

Exit the restroom when I am done.

Clean up after myself.

Use a level 0 voice.

Wait my turn.

Give others privacy.

Wash my hands thoroughly when I am done.

Hallway Expectations

Go directly to my destination. Use a level 0 voice. Use silent wave to greet others. Walk in a single file line. Stay to the right and keep my eyes forward. On the stairs, I will hold onto the railing and stay to the right.

Morning Arrival Expectations

Walk to my destination. Sit in front of my locker. Read or write silently. Use a level 0 voice. Follow the hall monitor's directions.

Dismissal Expectations

Go directly to my destination. Use a level 1 voice. Walk in a single file line until dismissed by my teacher.

Cafeteria Expectations

Raise my hand before getting up. Use a level 2 voice while at the table. Respond to quiet signal and listen to speaker. Use good manners. Walk and line up quietly for recess. Use a level 1 voice while in line.

Recess Expectations

Line up when the whistle is blown. Collect and return all equipment. Take turns. Respect the personal space of others. Use equipment as taught.

Assemblies Expectations

Sit on my pockets. Use a level 0 voice. Raise my hand to speak. Show the speaker that I am listening. Listen to my teacher's directions while entering and exiting.

All Settings Expectations

Come to school focused and ready to learn. Use the appropriate level voice. Use kind words. Follow directions the first time asked from all staff. Keep hands, feet and objects to myself.



School Rule on Fighting

If two students are involved in a fight, both students will be disciplined. Fighting is defined as any unwanted physical contact. If she/he returns the physical contact, she/he is automatically involved in the fight. Children who violate school rules may be sent to the Positive Action Center for retraining and/or to the office for a conference with the principal.

Habitual or serious violations may result in either in-school or out of school suspension.

Saddlebrook Library in Partnership with the Omaha Public Library

We will be using Omaha Public Library cards for our Saddlebrook students to check out books. Here are some Frequently Asked Questions...

Q: How does the partnership between Saddlebrook and the Omaha Public Library work?

A: With parental permissions, an Omaha Public Library card is issued to your child at the beginning of the school year if he/she does not already have one. The school librarian will retain a copy of the library card barcode so students can check out a book during library time at school.

Q: How do the return policies for library class differ from the receipt?

A: The Omaha Public Library receipt given at the time of check will usually list a 3-week due date. However, students will be reminded to return their library book(s) at each weekly scheduled library time. Students will be taught to return a book to get another book.

Q: What is the fine policy for late, damaged and lost books?


A: Per Omaha Public Library policy, children through age 13 are allowed a 60-day grace period for late return of juvenile items without penalty. After that grace period, fines/fees may be assessed. Please refer to the handout on Omaha Public Library overdue policy for more information. It is the responsibility of the student and the student's parent/guardian to pay replacement costs for all damaged and lost items.

Q: What is the fine policy for non-print materials?

A: Audiobooks and playaways are available for check out to Saddlebrook students during school hours. The replacement cost for these materials ranges between \$75.00-\$100.00 per item. This cost charaged as a fine if non-print items are lost or damaged.

Q: Can books be returned through the book drop prior to scheduled library times?

A: Yes! Students will be allowed to check out materials during scheduled library time if their books have previously been returned through the Omaha Public Library's book drop.


