Transferability	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Accepted by most institutions. See this link to search by college/university or by AP exam: AP Credit Policy Search – AP Students – College Board NOTE: some schools do not accept dual enrollment credit, so if the class is also an AP course it is important to take the AP Exam in May so that the student can still earn college credits. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Most in-state, out-of-state public and private institutions currently accept dual credit Students and/or parents/ guardians should talk directly to college and universities to see if and how dual enrollment credits will transfer Hours transferred based on institution's evaluation of coursework, generally all "core" credits are transferable in some manner
